

"Our Resurrection Hope"

For as in Adam all die, even so in Christ all shall be made alive.-1 Corinthians 15:22

If Jesus Christ was crucified but remains dead in the tomb, we are without hope. Our sins would remain. Death would continue to have the final say. We would be dust. Our lives and accomplishments would be nothing more than vapor in an endless, uncaring universe.

Christian hope, far from a glib shrug of the shoulders and a mumbled "I hope so," raises us to consider all our efforts, works, and lives to be a part of an unending history. Christian hope soars to the heavens specifically because it is grounded in an event in our history. Saint Paul writes and testifies,



³ For I delivered to you first of all that which I also received: that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, ⁴ and that He was buried, and that He rose again the third day according to the Scriptures, ⁵ and that He was seen by Cephas, then by the twelve. ⁶ After that He was seen by over five hundred brethren at once, of whom the greater part remain to the present, but some have fallen asleep. ⁷ After that He was seen by James, then by all the apostles. ⁶ Then last of all He was seen by me also, as by one born out of due time. - 1 Corinthians 15:3-8

Many witnesses have testified, and suffered torture and death for that testimony, that they saw Jesus risen from the dead and alive with their own eyes. The resurrection of Jesus was neither an apparition of wishful thinking nor a comforting story for a grieving community. It is the honest testimony of witnesses who saw Jesus alive in the flesh. It is a life-altering reality for us all.

Jesus promised that they would destroy the temple of His body but that in three days, He would raise it up. He promised that He would return to bring His people to live with Him and that He would give us eternal life. In His resurrection, Jesus shows all His promises to be true. Most importantly, His promise to take away our sins by His crucifixion and, through the forgiveness of sins, to give us life and salvation is found to be true in His victory over death and the grave.

When Jesus rose from the dead to be seen by so many witnesses, we, too, were raised from the power of sin and death. Now we see that being precious in God's sight, our lives are raised from obscurity to eternal communion with God. Jesus is alive! So also, are we alive in Him forever! Alleluia!






HOLY CROSS EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHAPEL Hazelwood

Built on the Rock the Church shall Stand Even when Steeples are Falling.

According to a recent study, fewer than half of Americans belong to a church. If that doesn't hit close enough to home, you can watch churches close all around us here in Western Pennsylvania. Of the seven LCMS congregations which formed Concordia Lutheran Ministries, only two remain open. Sadly, many once beautiful houses of worship, are now converted into breweries, concert halls, and apartment buildings marketed as, "nice, unique living space[s]." Consequently, in Hazelwood, Holy Cross Evangelical-Lutheran Chapel, your mission church in the Hazelwood community, stands as both the only outpost of Sacramental Christianity Hazelwood and the only open church left on Second Avenue, our "main drag." The former St. Stephen's Roman Catholic Church is closed, the former Good Shepherd Episcopal Church is closed, and the building for Morningstar Baptist church is condemned by the city.

When you look at the number of closed and small congregations in Pittsburgh, you can easily begin to despair. I understand the feeling as I too recently mourned the closure of St. Matthew's on the North Side. As we carried her altar and chancel furniture out of that magnificent building all those gathered were solemn and in a state of mourning. But Jesus has words to remind you and me of who we are amidst these uncertain times. Our Lord says,

¹³ "You are the salt of the earth, but if salt has lost its taste, how shall its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything except to be thrown out and trampled under people's feet. ¹⁴ "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. ¹⁵ Nor do people light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. ¹⁶ In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven.





PALM MISSION

Did we hear that right? You, me, and our churches are the "light of the world?" What an amazing statement! Prior to the construction of steeples, stained glass windows, the formation of our beloved Synod, and the chartering of our PALM congregations, Jesus referred to the faithful as the "salt of the earth" and the "light of the world." Faith alone saves. And if that wasn't wild enough, these words of comfort flow from the previous statement which reads: "Blessed are you when others revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for so they persecuted the prophets who were before you." These statements of Jesus remind you and me of this simple, comforting, and profound Scriptural truth: The Lord Jesus Christ has not, and will not abandon you, His bride, the church. Jesus Christ will never leave you, nor forsake you.

A beautiful reminder of this is Holy Cross Evangelical-Lutheran Chapel. The LCMS never had a presence in the Hazelwood community of Pittsburgh prior to the PALM Community Day in 2017, but now we have a mission church with a pastor and its own building that hosts daily prayer services, weekly Bible Studies, Bi-monthly community dinners, and regular food and clothing distributions which serve 150+families a month. Holy Cross on any given day is congregation with all her doors wide open to care for all the needs of body and soul. While it's a tragedy to watch congregations dating back a century close, it's a great joy to see new ones emerge. When you think about the impact God has make in Hazelwood in only seven years, we have no need to despair. For we, like Mary in the garden, who are in need of comfort and consolation during these dark times. And Jesus provides our needed consolation. Hear the words of St. John who writes:

¹¹ But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb, and as she wept she stooped to look into the tomb. ¹² And she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had lain, one at the head and one at the feet. ¹³ They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." ¹⁴ Having said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing, but she did not know that it was Jesus. ¹⁵ Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you seeking?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." ¹⁶ Jesus said to her, "Mary." She turned and said to him in Aramaic, "Rabboni!" (which means Teacher). ¹⁷ Jesus said to her, "Do not cling to me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father; but go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.'" ¹⁸ Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"—and that he had said these things to her.

Here is your consolation: Jesus has conquered death. Nothing can overtake Him, and nothing can prevent His will from being accomplished. We pray this daily in the Lord's Prayer as we say, "Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven." And we learn from the catechism:

How is God's will done? God's will is done when He breaks and hinders every evil plan and purpose of the devil, the world, and our sinful nature, which do not want us to hallow God's name or let His kingdom come; and when He strengthens and keeps us firm in His Word and faith until we die. This is His good and gracious will.

Dear Christian, I pray these words are of the utmost comfort to you, your parish, and your pastor. The fact that you have faith in the saving work of Jesus Christ is the accomplished will of God. Your faith working out in faithful worship to God and service to the neighbor is the light of the world! And no matter what the devil, the world, and your sinful nature does to prevent these good things from occurring in our beloved city, the good and gracious will of God will be accomplished. He will continue to establish His Kingdom through His Word and Sacrament; nothing can stop Him.

Therefore, take comfort dear brother and sister in Christ. Jesus is still softening hearts, converting souls to the one true faith, and daily ripping people out of the tight grasps of the devil and rebirthing them into His Holy Kingdom through Baptism where they are continually fed by His Word and Sacraments. And if you ever need that reminder, come, and visit Holy Cross to be encouraged and reminded of this beautiful work here taking place here in your midst. In conclusion, let us together sing these beautiful words of comfort from *Lutheran Service Book* hymn 645: Built on the Rock:

Built on the Rock the Church shall stand Even when steeples are falling. Crumbled have spires in ev'ry land; Bells still are chiming and calling, Calling the young and old to rest, But above all the soul distressed, Longing for rest everlasting.

Surely in temples made with hands God, the Most High, is not dwelling; High above earth His temple stands, All earthly temples excelling. Yet He who dwells in heav'n above Chooses to live with us in love, Making our bodies His temple.

We are God's house of living stones, Built for His own habitation. He through baptismal grace us owns Heirs of His wondrous salvation. Were we but two His name to tell, Yet He would deign with us to dwell With all His grace and His favor.

Here stands the font before our eyes, Telling how God has received us. Th'altar recalls Christ's sacrifice And what His Supper here gives us. Here sound the Scriptures that proclaim Christ yesterday, today, the same, And evermore, our Redeemer.

Grant, then, O God, Your will be done, That, when the church bells are ringing, Many in saving faith may come Where Christ His message is bringing: "I know MY own; My own know Me. You, not the world, My face shall see. My peace I leave with you. Amen."

From 1969 - 2014 Karin was owner and partner with her late husband, James of Emphatics, a lifestyle boutique built on the belief that fashion was an important art form and expression of freedom. The vision let the couple go to Paris in the late '70s where a young group of designers emerged and revolutionized the fashion industry. After James' passing, The Phoenix Art Museum acquired "Emphatics Archives" including 400 pieces and ephemera. Where an exhibition titled "Emphatics Avent Garde Fashion 1963-2013 was mounted in November of 2016 and exhibited through January of 2017. Today Karin continues to partner with the Japanese Design House of Issey Miyake.


