# Monday - Saturday

There's a running joke that Pastor's only work one day a week.

That's not exactly true. We also work Christmas Eve and Good Friday.

But what DO Pastors do during the week? Do we sit in dimly lit rooms surrounded by big books? Do we spend hours in liturgical prayer? Do we walk the halls of hospitals, nursing homes and rehabilitation facilities? Do we work on our golf game?

I'm not going to give away the secrets of what we pastors do on a weekly basis (because it is always something different), but two things I've had the privilege of doing as your pastor are attending the Vicarage Supervisor's Conference at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis as well as taking a couple of classes at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary.

At the Vicarage Supervisor's Conference I was able to meet with other Vicarage Supervisors as well as seminary faculty for a period of a couple of days. We learned about the state of the seminary, the challenges of doing ministry in the 21st Century, and how to have a successfully vicarage experience.

Having had time to think about what was presented and discussed, two of the things that are definitely worth sharing with you are...

We have an extraordinary vicar. Even the Vicarage Program Director (Glenn Nielsen) said that we were given one of the best students the seminary has. We could not have asked for a better vicar, nor should we expect David's equal in subsequent vicars.

Secondly, we are one of very few (if any) vicarage congregations that understands the purpose of the vicarage program: to help prepare a man (and his family) for life in the Pastoral Ministry. Because we are the smallest (numerically) vicarage congregation, David does not a cog in some large multi-staff ministry. And because we understand the purpose of the vicarage program, you want him to experience (as close as we can) what awaits him in the pastoral ministry.

Also, you have given me permission and encouragement to begin taking classes (part-time) at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. This quarter I'm taking Old Testament History and Ethics classes. I hope to be able to translate what I am learning into my sermons and Bible studies, as well as other areas of Pastoral Ministry. Thank you for giving me the freedom to expand my academic knowledge and experience; I hope that, when this (tentatively) 2 year adventure is over, it will prove to be a blessing to Zion, my family, and the ministry of the Gospel.

# On Pope Francis' Recent Pronouncement

In a recent 12,000-word interview, Pope Francis (head of the 1.2 billion member Roman Catholic Church) made statements to the effect that the church has been too focused on things like homosexuality and abortion at the expense of losing the "freshness and fragrance of the gospel." Opinion writers worked overtime spinning the Pope's words to their political or social advantage. Now it's my turn.

Those who think the Roman Catholic Church is going to change their doctrinal positions on either abortion or homosexuality need to think again. The Pope was not talking about changing positions, but on emphasis and image. Let me explain.

Evangelism is a lot like speed dating. Not familiar with speed dating? It's a relatively recent phenomenon when a bunch of single men and women spend a very brief amount of time in one-on-one situations in a controlled environment. At the end of the evening, people who made a first-impression connection exchange contact information. (At least this is what I learned about speed dating from the movie Hitch and the TV show House.) The point is that evangelism is a lot like speed dating; first impressions are all that counts.

It appears to be the Pope's contention that the first impression of the Roman Catholic Church has been its stances on abortion and homosexuality. He does not believe this should be, for lack of a better phrase, the church's pick-up line. The church, he contends, should lead off with something more inclusive, more inviting, more (again, pardon the analogy to speed dating) romantic and flattering.

Does the Pope have a point? When it comes to how we are perceived, is it more for our moral values and our perceived political affections than the gospel of Jesus Christ? (The answer is an unqualified yes.) The question we have to ask ourselves is: would I rather my neighbor/ co-worker/ friend/ family hear the good news that their sins are forgiven because of the death and resurrection of Jesus than that they behave and vote the way we think they should?

How we answer this question shapes our congregation, our relationships, our faith, and the future of the church. The choice is obvious, but the decision is yours.


# Harvestfest II

Our school year is off to another great start. We have the highest number of students enrolled in the history of the school...114! Our classes include 1 Stepping Stones class, 2 PreKindergarten classes, 3 PreSchool classes and 2 Small Steps classes. To accommodate all of these wonderful children, we had to add some new staff members as well. Kara Garrubba is working in the PreKindergarten class with Mrs. Barb, Kellie Stock is working in the Small Steps class with Mrs. Paula, and Susan Liptak spends her time in the Small Steps class Mondays and Wednesdays and in the Stepping Stones class on Fridays.

October will be filled with lots of activities and excitement. We will start the month with a Fire Drill for all classes. October is fire prevention month and we will have a visit from "Firefigher Phil". Firefighter Phil brings his friend, Al E. Cat along to help teach the children about fire safety and prevention. The program uses magic, games and ventriloquism with Al E. Cat to engage the children and keep their attention while they learn. Firefighter Phil also brings one of his friends from the Bridgeville fire department in "full fireman gear". The day concludes with a visit to the fire truck where the children can go inside and explore. What a blast!

We will also have our first Chapel in October...The Parable of the Pumpkin. "For God, who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," make His light shine in our hearts to give us the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Christ." 2 Corinthians 4:6. This lesson uses two jack-o-lanterns, one happy with a lit candle inside and one unhappy, dark pumpkin. The carved pumpkins help to explain the Gospel story in a very "visual" way. The lesson explains the differences between living life with Jesus and living life without Jesus. We will also read "The Pumpkin Patch Parable." It is our prayer that these two activities help to make the Gospel message more clear and meaningful to the children. "When Jesus spoke again to the people, He said, I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life." John 8:12

## **Special Voters Meeting - Outcome**

At a Special Voter's meeting on August 25, 2013 the voter's of Zion approved the Sanctuary Improvement project.

- 1a. Carpet/Tile Combination
- 2a. Window Tinting
- 3a. Altar Cushions
- 4.a Painting Heating Units
- 5b. Pew Refurbishment and New Pew Chairs
- 6c. Air Conditioning

The estimated cost is broken down into three financial components. The first financial components 1a - 4a are estimated at \$47,000. The second financial component 5b is estimated at \$20,000. The third financial component 6c is estimated at \$35,000. The total cost of the project is estimated around \$102,000.

We are targeting to complete items 1 – 5 in early 2014 and item 6 in late spring. You might have all ready received or will be receiving information on the fundraiser initiative for this project.

Keep a lookout for the fundraising information in your mail.
