The Christian Life in a Fast Food Bullet-point Hook-Up Culture

I promised myself I wouldn't be "that" guy. I didn't like "that" guy. I rolled my eyes whenever "that" guy spoke up. "That" guy wanted to tell his life story instead of contributing to the discussion. I did not want to be "that" guy.

It had been nine years since I last set foot in a classroom. What could have possibly changed since May, 2005 in the hallowed halls of Academia? Plenty, I found out as the first day of the '13-'14 school year began in late August at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. I was the only person in the classroom without bifocals with a pen and paper. All of the millennials had computers. (I found out later that taking class notes on these computers was really their secondary function; up-to-the-minute sports scores and Facebook status updates were their true raison d'etre.) But the reliance on more computing power than was necessary to land man on the moon to take notes on a lecture wasn't the biggest change I saw in the classroom; it was the reluctance of the 20-something students to attempt to convey cogent thoughts to the professor in prose. One of the students in a class this spring actually asked if he could write his final essay in bullet-point format. As strange as this was to hear in the moment, upon further reflection, the student's request made perfect sense.

By now, I hope you're well aware that I see Post-Modernism as the greatest opportunity to proclaim the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ since the Holy Spirit gave His gift at Pentecost. But one of the unintended consequences of Post-Modernism has been a shift in communication (not only from printed to electronic, but also) from lengthy, organized and well laid-out arguments to one-liners, zingers and bulletpoints. People no longer want to be bothered by details; only an executive summary in bullet-point format will do. Because contemplation is an unacceptable form of entertainment, the addicts of visual stimulation have no need for it. And so the question is asked in a graduate-level class: can I do my term paper in bullet-point format.

Not surprisingly, we have done to food what we have done to reading and writing. The production of a family meal is no longer enjoyable. It is an evil thing that needs to be cut as short as possible. A sitdown dinner with the family, or a conversation in the kitchen while mom carefully prepares the family meal, is seen as a terrible waste of time. Time is better spent in front of a screen with as little activity going on between the ears as possible. So intent are we on avoiding that horrible waste of time known as "family time" that we're willing to eat a pile of grease and saccharine ingredients from a bag that we know will make us lethargic, fat and unhealthy.

Promiscuity is nothing new. (I hope this doesn't come as a revelation to anyone.) But in years gone by, the misuse of God's gift of sexuality was done in the (mistaken) hope that it might create love and commitment, or (at the very least) give some kind of advantage to one or both partners. (The stories of Ruth and Esther come to mind.) But today, (usually younger) people sacrifice their purity and innocence on the altar of dishonest acceptance and soulless pleasure. There is no thought of love or commitment, let alone God's plan and design for marriage and children. The hook-up culture is a short-term problem looking for a solution in all the wrong places.

So how does a Christian live out their faith when all around them functional expedience trumps virtue, relationships, and contemplation? Rather easily, I would argue. See, in this culture, the Christian life stands out. It looks different. And it is something that not a few of those on the outside would want for themselves. So go ahead, Christ has given you permission to live out your faith with boldness and conviction. Take time over the family dinner table—the internet and T.V. can wait. Instead of talking about superficial nothingnesses with people, challenge them (and yourself) with conversations about things that matter. Spend time alone contemplating these things too. And don't be afraid to say "no" to the ungodliness of the hook-up culture. It is an empty well that steals but does not give back. Love is not found in the bedroom of a stranger, but in the empty tomb of a Savior. Freedom is not found in the guilt of the morning after, but in the darkness of the afternoon of the first Good Friday. You really are salt; you are truly light. The post-modern era has defined itself as a relativistic search for what works. The death of Christ works. The resurrection of Christ works. And the new life we have in Christ works. It works for us. It works for all! Dear Christians, now more than ever, let your light shine!

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL NEWS!



Voters Meeting - Outcome

On June 29, 2014 the Voters of Zion approved the 2014/2015 fiscal budget that included:

Overall budget increased from last budget by 3% Average salary increases of 4% for church and school staff

Continued support for Vicar ministry and outreach programs

Support for youth and mission ministry programs
Increase in school tuition and number of students
Increase in music ministry budget with a Music
Director

We were pleased to present another break-even budget (\$520,409 expense equal \$520,409 revenue), but we were especially pleased to announce for the sixth year that we have no major carry-over expenses. The Preschool continues to be self-funded. This financial picture was accomplished throughout the year with increased Church, Mission & Synod (CMS) giving by 3%, special project (sanctuary improvement and air conditioning) gifts of \$100,000 and strong expense controls.

Just a reminder, as we enter into summer vacations we tend to see giving decrease, so we encourage you to remember Zion while you are away on vacation, since our expenses don't go on vacation. Please continue to pray for Zion that we are able to end this new budget year with a positive cash flow.
