#### What Makes God Laugh

What makes you laugh? Is it a well-timed one-liner? A joke that needs to be set-up and delivered just-so? Slapstick? Irony? Sarcasm? What makes you laugh? Is it time around the campfire with the guys, telling the same stories of the glory days of time gone by? Or is it in the comfortable confines of a friend's house and a half-empty bottle of wine? Is it going out with friends or at something someone sent you over the internet?

I've heard it said that the Duck-Billed Platypus is proof that God has a sense of humor. I'm not sure who came up with that saying, but it lets the Naked Mole Rat off way too easily. With that being said, God's sense of humor is not found in the creation of strangely proportioned or unfortunately named animals. God's sense of humor—what makes him laugh—is found in the Bible, specifically (and uniquely) in Psalm 2.

Psalm 2 is a Psalm of David to be read (or sung) at his son Solomon's coronation as king. One can only imagine the powerful impact it had; the words of the beloved deceased king honoring his son as he succeeded his father as king. The Psalm does a beautiful job of honoring Solomon as king of a united monarchy while also looking forward to the King of God's people, Jesus the Christ. It does so with these words:

Why do the nations rage and the peoples plot in vain?

The kings of the earth set themselves,

And the rulers take counsel together against the Lord and against his anointed, saying,

"Let us burst their bonds apart and cast away their cords from us."

These are the mighty men of earth, the kings and rulers—people who have dominion over the lives of those under their authority. And they want nothing to do with the Lord. If this sounds not a little bit like the rulers of the people today, it is no accident. They want God removed from their lives and the lives of the people under them. They prefer overt atheism, undercover atheism (agnosticism) or a docile deism over the God of Biblical Revelation and the Lord Jesus Christ. Him they cannot have.

So how does God take to being rejected by the mighty men of earth? Is he threatened by their rejection? Does their rebellion and faithlessness threaten his rule and reign? Hardly. Here is how God replies to those who rebel against him: He who sits in the heavens laughs. What makes God laugh is the pitiable attempts of mortal men to set themselves in opposition to him.

We may not like it, but we are living in a time where the influence of Christianity on culture is waning. The norms and values of the people around us do not agree with the way of life we have been called to in Christ. It is popular to mock God. Claiming God does not exist is academically preferable to being a person of faith. More and more, people want nothing to do with God. If God's response to this is to laugh, we should not be frightened, alarmed, or even troubled by it. Instead, we should rejoice in what God has done when "the nations rage and the peoples plot in vain." God's response to rebellion and unbelief is this: "As for me, I have set my king on Zion, my holy hill." God says: "My response to your little attempt at rebellion is to send Jesus, my King, who will die on Golgotha, a hill he made holy through the shedding of his blood. Because, you see, the rightful king of creation is not one who rules by naked force, but one who rules in grace and mercy, humility and service. Only Jesus, my son, has the right to reign. I have installed him and there is nothing you can do about it because you do not have what it takes to arrest the throne from him."

When it looks like God is not in control, that his enemies are making great gains in our world, remember it is at times like these when God laughs.


## **Sunday School News**
