#### **CALIPHATE**

Caliphate. It's a word that has been tossed around lately, usually in the context of ISIS. But unless you're a student of Islam, you probably don't know what this word means, or why it should mater to you. Bear with me as I give you a quick history lesson. Muhammad kicks off Islam in the first several decades of the 7th Century. Unable to convince the neighboring Christian and Jewish communities that he was a prophet from God, Muhammad resorted to the sword to spread the "religion of peace." He conquered the Arabian peninsula (and then some) before his death. His successors were called Caliphs and they ruled their territory by "Shariah," what we today call "Muslim Law," a legal system resting on the teachings of the Qu'ran. Territory ruled by the Caliphs was called a "Caliphite." ISIS (the "Islamic State Iraq and Syria") has started calling itself simply "IS," or "Islamic State." It views itself as a modern-day Caliphite. But Caliphites were more than territory governed by Islamic Law, or Shariah; they spread violently, demanding conversion by conquered foes. Those who would not convert would be shown the end of the sword. By claiming to be a Caliphite, the Islamic State is doing more than projecting what its governing authority is, it is projecting how it will spread.

So what does this have to do with us? We are not the primary focus of the hostilities of the "IS." And while an attack on American soil might help them raise money from its radical supporters, conquering our country is not one of is strategic objectives. Yet we should care. People who share our faith, who have been called by the Gospel and proclaim as we do that Jesus Christ is Lord are being asked to do the impossible or face the unthinkable; they are told they must deny Christ or be put to death. And so we pray.

But as we look at the "IS" abroad and the evils in our culture here at home, we do not do so from a position of weakness or uncertainty. Rather, we approach the situation in Iraq and Syria in the same way we approach the narcissistic culture of materialistic boredom in our Brave New World. We do it through the lens of the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ; we see a world loved by its creator, and people redeemed by one of their own. We also view the events of this failing age through the lens of the resurrection of the Son of God; we see creation under the authority of one who calls himself our brother, and who invites him to call his Father our father. We know the beginning and we know the end. We know who wins and we know who to trust.

The threats and the dangers we, and others who share our faith, face are real, but they are defeated. They are serious, but they cannot win. As Paul writes in Romans 9:33, "Behold, I am laying in Zion a stone of stumbling, and a rock of offense; and whoever believes in him will not be put to shame."

## **Oktoberfest**

Ein Prosit, Ein Prosit der gemutlichkeit! This is the opening sentence to one of the most popular Oktoberfest songs. I remember my first Oktoberfest at the seminary. There were copious amounts of food and drinks, so that we were eating brats for the next week. There was a live polka band which played all night and took requests. A friend of mine, who had just come back from Germany, kept requesting "Ein Prosit". It got annoying. But it probably reminded him of the Oktoberfest he had celebrated in Munich a year earlier.

Munich is the city where it all started. On October 12, 1810 Prince Ludwig (who would later become King Ludwig) married Princess Therese of Saxe-Hildburghausen. In order to celebrate this joyous occasion, the Crown Prince Ludwig held a massive party. The citizens of Munich were invited to come to the meadow, "wiesn", in front of the city gate where there would be food, games, horse races, an agricultural show and, of course, beer. The meadow where the celebration was held was renamed to *Theresienwiese* or "Therese's meadow" and is still called this today. Eventually the date of the celebration would be moved to September and end in October.

When German immigrants came to the United States for many reasons, they kept their traditions, cuisine, and language. This is the same case for the Saxon immigrants who would eventually found the Lutheran Church of Missouri, Ohio and other States, or as we know it today, the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. Up until the First World War, services were conducted in German. There were very few services that were in English before this, and even today, some members of the LCMS were taught Luther's Small Catechism in German. In my home church, we sing Christmas carols in German. Other traditions are things such as potlucks, jell-o, and burnt coffee. Here at Zion, we are continuing a tradition that hearkens back to our German roots and engages us in good fellowship.

Zion will be having its 6<sup>th</sup> annual Oktoberfest this year on Sunday, Sept 7 from 4:00-7:30 P.M. There will be traditional German food, such as brats, schnitzel, and German chocolate cake, as well as games for kids. It will be a good time to enjoy one another's company, and an opportunity to tell the good news about Christ, as all are welcome. Oktoberfest is even open to all sister churches in the area to strengthen the bond that we have in Christ. So, mark your calendars for Sunday September 7 and join us for some Gemutlichkeit!


