

This week, we wrap up our study on Jonah. We'll be taking a look at Jonah 4, where we see Jonah's reaction to God's reaction to the prayer and repentance of the Ninevites. We will also see God's reaction to Jonah's reaction to God's reaction to the prayer and repentance of the Ninevites.

At issue is the quantity and quality of God's grace.

The text makes us believe Jonah did not want God to extend the same amount of grace to the Ninevites as he himself (and his countrymen) had received; nor did he want the grace God extended to the Ninevites to be as pure as the grace he himself (and his countrymen) had received. God's grace is too great and there is too much of it for Jonah's liking.

As much as I do not want to admit it, I see myself writ large on God's Rebellious Prophet, Jonah. I have a hard time with God being gracious and merciful to people who are not like me, who I do not care for, or whose past includes sins and decisions I find most distasteful. And yet God's grace is more than sufficient even for the worst of sinners. God's grace does not discriminate.

The Reading: Jonah 4

But to Jonah this seemed very wrong, and he became angry. He prayed to the Lord, "Isn't this what I said, Lord, when I was still at home? That

is what I tried to forestall by fleeing to Tarshish. I knew that you are a gracious and compassionate God, slow to anger and abounding in love, a God who relents from sending calamity. Now, Lord, take away my life, for it is better for me to die than to live."

But the Lord replied, "Is it right for you to be angry?"

Jonah had gone out and sat down at a place east of the city. There he made himself a shelter, sat in its shade and waited to see what would happen to the city. Then the Lord God provided a leafy plant and made it grow up over Jonah to give shade for his head to ease his discomfort, and Jonah was very happy about the plant. But at dawn the next day God provided a worm, which chewed the plant so that it withered. When the sun rose, God provided a scorching east wind, and the sun blazed on Jonah's head so that he grew faint. He wanted to die, and said, "It would be better for me to die than to live."

But God said to Jonah, "Is it right for you to be angry about the plant?"

"It is," he said. "And I'm so angry I wish I were dead."

But the Lord said, "You have been concerned about this plant, though you did not tend it or make it grow. It sprang up overnight and died overnight. And should I not have concern for the great city of Nineveh, in which there are more than a hundred and twenty thousand people who cannot tell their right hand from their left—and also many animals?"
