

Welcome to worship!

This evening our study of Romans continues! This is our last Romans Study before we enter the season of Advent. We've got a Thanksgiving Eve Service next Wednesday and then our Advent Series on the "Four Advents." We'll be back to our Romans study in January.

We've got a lot to cover this evening. Our focus during the service is Romans 8:1-11. These are some of the most difficult words Paul writes in all of Romans. And some of the most important. "Therefore," he begins, "there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus." When someone asks you what it means that Jesus died on the cross, you could answer them with these words. Because of Christ, we are not condemned by a holy God for the sins we have committed. We are forgiven and do not need to fear divine punishment.

But Paul has more to say. He goes on to talk about how we have been come out from under the ownership and control of the flesh (and sin, which leads to death) and are now under the controlling influence of the Holy Spirit (which leads to faith and righteousness). As Luther wrote in the Bondage of the Will (and I am paraphrasing here): "Man's will is like a beast standing between two riders. If God rides, he wills and goes where God wants; if Satan rides, he wills and goes where Satan wants. But he does not determine who his rider will be; God and Satan decide who will have and hold him."

The Reading: Romans 8:1-11

There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. For the law of the Spirit of life has set you free in Christ Jesus from the law of sin and death. For God has done what the law, weakened by the flesh, could not do. By sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh and for sin, he condemned sin in the flesh, in order that the righteous requirement of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not according to the flesh but according to the Spirit. For those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh, but those who live according to the Spirit set their minds on the things of the Spirit. For to set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. For the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God, for it does not submit to God's law; indeed, it cannot. Those who are in the flesh cannot please God.

You, however, are not in the flesh but in the Spirit, if in fact the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. But if Christ is in you, although the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ Jesus from the

dead will also give life to your mortal bodies through his Spirit who dwells in you.

Unite my heart to fear Your name that I may walk in Your

truth.
