

Welcome to worship!

So what?

So far, in our study of Romans, Paul has laid out the case for the gospel. He has painstakingly taught that all people (Jews and Gentiles) stand under the Law and are judged by it. None is righteous; all are controlled by the flesh and cannot save themselves. And so God sent Jesus into the world to lay down his life as a sacrifice that sufficiently atoned for the sins of the world. Now, those who are under the controlling influence of the Holy Spirit (made evident by faith in the heart and professing Christ as Lord by the tongue) are saved.

So what are we to make of the extravagant mercy and love of God? What is our response to the salvation God has freely given us? Are we to say "thank you," and then be on our way, or does the mercy and grace and God not only transform our identity, but also radically change our lives—our priorities and values? This evening, we will be taking a look at the opening verses of Romans 12, where Paul makes the practical implications from the Gospel he has just taught. What should our response to the grace and mercy of God in Christ be? Paul tells us very clearly: we are to make our bodies living sacrifices to the God of our salvation, having our minds transformed by the knowledge of Christ and faith in the Gospel.

The Reading: Romans 12:1-8

I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect.

For by the grace given to me I say to everyone among you not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think, but to think with sober judgment, each according to the measure of faith that God has assigned. For as in one body we have many members, and the members do not all have the same function, so we, though many, are one body in Christ, and individually members one of another. Having gifts that differ according to the grace given to us, let us use them: if prophecy, in proportion to our faith; if service, in our serving; the one who teaches, in his teaching; the one who exhorts, in his exhortation; the one who contributes, in generosity; the one who leads, with zeal; the one who does acts of mercy, with cheerfulness.

Pastor: O Lord, have mercy on us.

People: Thanks be to God.

Pastor: Teach me Your way, O Lord, that I may walk in Your truth.

Unite my heart to fear Your name that I may walk in Your

truth.

People: Your Word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path.
