First Midweek Lent February 17th, 2016

Welcome to Zion Lutheran Church!

How could the crowd shout "Hosanna!" on Sunday and "Crucify him!" on Friday? What did Jesus do in Jerusalem during the week leading up to his death (and resurrection)? This evening, our Lenten Midweek Series begins, as we take a look at what Jesus did between "Palm Sunday" and "Good Friday." All four Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke and John) spend a disproportionate amount of time focusing on what Jesus did during the week leading up to his crucifixion. Matthew spends seven chapters, Mark five, Luke five, and John eight. But other than Palm Sunday and the institution of the Lord's Supper, do you know what Jesus did during that week?

We are going to limit our study to the events recorded in the Gospel of Matthew, as it would simply be too much to try to cover all twenty-five chapters of material in six twenty(ish) minute sermons. And so, this evening, we are going to begin where the week begins, "Palm Sunday." But should we call it that? After all, even though all four gospels record Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, only one of them makes mention of palm branches. OK, then, maybe we should call it the "Triumphal Entry"? But of the two crowds gathered in Jerusalem, only one sings Jesus' praise; and Jesus himself has said on three different occasions that the reason why he was coming into Jerusalem was not to conquer it, but to suffer and die at the hands of the authorities.

I hope you are looking forward to spending time together in God's Word over the next six weeks, as together we take a look at what Jesus said and did in the week leading up to his crucifixion. There's a lot to learn, and even more to live by.

The Gospel Reading: Matthew 21:1-17

Now when they drew near to Jerusalem and came to Bethphage, to the Mount of Olives, then Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, "Go into the village in front of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her. Untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, you shall say, 'The Lord needs them,' and he will send them at once." This took place to fulfill what was spoken by the prophet, saying, "Say to the daughter of Zion, 'Behold, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a beast of burden."

The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them. They brought the donkey and the colt and put on them their cloaks, and he sat on them. Most of the crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. And the crowds that went before him and that followed him were shouting, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest!" And when he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was stirred up, saying, "Who is this?" And the crowds said, "This is the prophet Jesus, from Nazareth of Galilee."

And Jesus entered the temple and drove out all who sold and bought in the temple, and he overturned the tables of the money-changers and the seats of those who sold pigeons. He said to them, "It is written, 'My house shall be called a house of prayer,' but you make it a den of robbers."

And the blind and the lame came to him in the temple, and he healed them. But when the chief priests and the scribes saw the wonderful things that he did, and the children crying out in the temple, "Hosanna to the Son of David!" they were indignant, and they said to him, "Do you hear what these are saying?" And Jesus said to them, "Yes; have you never read, "Out of the mouth of infants and nursing babies you have prepared praise'?"

And leaving them, he went out of the city to Bethany and lodged there.
