Contemporary Philosophy and the Resurrection of Jesus

"Pastor, my son came home from school today and asked me what we believe about dinosaurs." "Pastor, my daughter came home from school today and asked me what we believe about evolution." "Pastor, the guy | work with wants to know if we believe in marriage equality." "Pastor, my parents asked me if we believe in angels." | love my job and the questions | get asked. | get excited when | hear the words, "Pastor, do you have time to meet? There's something important | want to talk with you about." Behind every serious question is a person with a life story, questions about

their faith, and a unique lens through which they see the world. Every serious question presents an opportunity to bring glory to God by speaking the name of Jesus.

For this month's newsletter article, I want to address what I think is the major, unarguable flaw in the contemporary philosophy that challenges our faith on so many fronts. What is strange is that this "contemporary philosophy" has been around since the beginning of humanity. Every generation believes it has surpassed the one before it in wisdom and knowledge to a degree that renders all previous ages primitive and simple. Today, people are certain that the universe is 14.6 billion years old, that all life evolved from a common ancestor, and that it all came into existence from the "Big Bang." Today, people are certain that the major world views, religions and philosophies that came before it represent less educated thinking and were based on inferior knowledge. We are advanced; they were backwards. We are moving forward! We must leave the past behind. Relativism replaced modernism, which replaced rationalism, which replaced what came before it. What is new is better; in material goods as well as human thought and expression.

How Contemporary Philosophy sees the world is constantly changing, it is always evolving. Every new revelation changes the lens through which the world sees itself and replaces what came before it. But most people cannot see that it has always been this way and that what is believed to be true today is just the next thing to be replaced by what is discovered to be true tomorrow.

But it doesn't have to be this way. This month, we celebrate the resurrection of Christ. That is, the singular event in human history that fundamentally changes the way we see the world, God's role in it, and what our future holds. The resurrection of Christ destroys what we thought we know about being human, bends the laws of nature to God's will, and gives us a lens through which to see the world that is radically different than every Contemporary Philosophy that came before it, or that has come since. Death has been defeated. It is tragic, but it is not final. That God raised Jesus means more than that he is real; it means that he is concerned with the affairs of the people living on the third rock from the sun. It means we matter to him. The resurrection of Christ does not need to accommodate itself to whatever the Contemporary Philosophy is; it stands apart from the always-changing opinions of men, judges them, and renders them all inadequate to wrestle with the longings and desires of human hearts.

Christ is risen!


CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Hey Zion!

We've been given a tremendous opportunity to serve our sister congregations, encourage the faith of our extended church family, and even reach the greater Pittsburgh Community with the Gospel, but we need your help.



The Pittsburgh Lutheran is looking for new editors.

What is the Pittsburgh Lutheran? The Pittsburgh Lutheran is produced by PALM (Pittsburgh Area Lutheran Ministries) to inform the LCMS congregations in Pittsburgh what the other LCMS congregations in Pittsburgh are doing. It is a monthly publication.

What do the editors do? Three things. First, they send out monthly e-mails to the LCMS congregations, reminding them when their articles are due. When articles arrive (via e-mail), they arrange and format the articles to fit into the newsletter template. And lastly, they send the finished product to the printer who copies and distributes the magazine. In all, it takes about 8 hours per month.

What are we looking for? A team of Zion volunteers to take on the project. You would not personally be responsible for everything, but would work with a team to get it done, improve the product over time, and be part of an effort to inform and encourage our brothers and sisters in Christ who belong to sister congregations in the Pittsburgh area.

Do I need to be a professional journalist, writer or editor? No. Anyone who can send e-mail and be willing to be trained to learn the software that formats the magazine, who has a heart for outreach and mission, and who has a desire to serve would be a valuable team member.

What is the commitment? The total time it takes to gather, edit and arrange is 8 hours. Depending on the size and ability of the team, an individual's responsibilities could be very minimal (sending out an e-mail). We are not asking for a large commitment; ideally we will have a team that can spread the work around.

Greetings from the

Preschool

Happy March! We love March here at Zion Preschool. It's a time when we focus on Spring and all the new signs of life that come with Spring. Our biggest lesson this month will be spent on the Easter story. I have the pleasure of teaching the chapel lesson this month, and honestly, it is my favorite lesson to teach. I use a set of plastic Easter eggs, each filled with an item that helps tell the story. The children are so excited to see what is in each egg, but will not understand why the last egg is empty, at least, not at first. "Mrs. Tracey....did you forgot to put something in the last egg?" This is what I usually hear when I open the last empty egg. I then explain that the last egg represents the empty tomb on Easter morning...Jesus is alive and we have new life in Him!

We also focus on the color green, and talk about St. Patrick's Day. We explain that the shamrock, a plant with three parts to its leaf, like a 3 leaf clover, is like the Trinity. Even though the leaf has three parts, it is still one leaf, as the Father, Son and Holy Spirit are three in one God.

Just like the leaves on each Shamrock I see, There are three parts to the Holy Trinity. First is God the Father, then Jesus, His only Son, And the Holy Spirit together as ONE.

We will be starting a new mission project in March, as well. It's called "Feed my starving children". We are partnering with South Fayette School District to feed as many starving children around the world as possible. Each child will go home with an M&Ms tube filled with mini candies which they can enjoy with their family. When all the candy is gone, we are asking each family to fill the empty tube with quarters and return it to Zion. If the tube is filled with quarters it will feed 63 children as it is only 22 cents per meal! I will be going to each classroom during Jesus Time to talk about this project. Children are always so eager to help other children... I think it will be a huge success.

Registration continues to go very well. We currently have 131 children signed up for the 2016/2017 school year and it's only March. Gooooo Zion!!





focus is from Romans 12: 10 "Love one another with brotherly affections. Outdo one another in showing honor."



We hope that you enjoy listening to the Adult Choir, Children's Choir, Reverence (a.k.a M@ZE), and the various solo/duet performances by many of our talented church members. The goal for this year is to create another performing group that is accessible for just about anyone....Bell Choir! Musical talent/experience is not required to participate in this group. However, we need to purchase the bells before we start recruiting "ringers". The approximate cost for a standard 3 octave set of bells is \$12,000 which includes not only the bells themselves, but protective cases, performance tables, foam mats, music stands, gloves, polishing materials, and music. Whew!

Last October church council established a bell choir account for anyone that would like to contribute to this area of the music ministry. If you would like to give to this ministry, please make a note on your check or offering envelope that you wish to give to the bell choir account. We are also providing an opportunity for members to "buy a bell" in honor or memory of loved ones or your family. The price for the "buy a bell program" is \$325 per bell.
