Welcome to worship!

This evening, we are going to study the first chapter of 1 Timothy, part of our Bible in a Year Reading for today. This is Paul's first letter to a man he discipled, took under his wing, and poured his life into. Now responsible for the church in Ephesus, Timothy receives this letter from his former teacher, now partner in ministry. What the Apostle writes to the Pastor matters to the Parishoner.

Paul writes about competing theologies and philosophies, the role of the Law in the life of the Christian, the transforming power of the Gospel and the forgiveness of sins, and the role of church discipline and the real possibility of losing one's faith. That's a lot to choose from for a 15-20 minute sermon. And I am sure in the time between when I am writing this (Monday morning) and when the sermon is put together (possibly Monday afternoon... maybe on the ride back from St. Louis on Wednesday afternoon), I'll narrow down what we are going to spend our time together contemplating. (The whole chapter is simply just too much for one sermon!)

There is a lot of good stuff here in 1 Timothy 1; too much to cover in one message. If you are doing Bible in a Year, I know you'll appreciate your time in 1 Timothy (especially this first chapter). If you are not doing Bible in a Year; please take the time to study at least this first chapter of 1 Timothy. We'll cover a little bit of it this evening, but the whole chapter (the whole book!) is more than worthy of your time and attention.

Confession and Absolution

Pastor: In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

People: Amen.

Pastor: This evening, our focus is on the importance of sound doctrine.

We have been called to cling to what is good, and reject what is evil. But too often, we have tried to accommodate the futile thinking of this age with our Christ-centered faith. We have called disobedience compromise. Therefore, let us confess our sins to God, trusting in his mercy through our Lord Jesus Christ

to grant us forgiveness.

People: Lord Jesus Christ, I confess to you that I have ignored the

truth of Your Word, choosing friendship with the world

over friendship with God. I have led myself astray.

Forgive me. Return me to the truth of Your Word. Teach me to delight in the truth and to look for opportunities to demonstrate my faith in you through obedience to Your

Word. I ask this in Jesus' name. Amen.

People: Amen!

The First Reading: 1 Timothy 1

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by command of God our Savior and of Christ Jesus our hope,

To Timothy, my true child in the faith:

Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord.

As lurged you when I was going to Macedonia, remain at Ephesus so that you may charge certain persons not to teach any different doctrine, nor to devote themselves to myths and endless genealogies, which promote speculations rather than the stewardship from God that is by faith. The aim of our charge is

love that issues from a pure heart and a good conscience and a sincere faith. Certain persons, by swerving from these, have wandered away into vain discussion, desiring to be teachers of the law, without understanding either what they are saying or the things about which they make confident assertions.

Now we know that the law is good, if one uses it lawfully, understanding this, that the law is not laid down for the just but for the lawless and disobedient, for the ungodly and sinners, for the unholy and profane, for those who strike their fathers and mothers, for murderers, the sexually immoral, men who practice homosexuality, enslavers, liars, perjurers, and whatever else is contrary to sound doctrine, in accordance with the gospel of the glory of the blessed God with which I have been entrusted.

I thank him who has given me strength, Christ Jesus our Lord, because he judged me faithful, appointing me to his service, though formerly I was a blasphemer, persecutor, and insolent opponent. But I received mercy because I had acted ignorantly in unbelief, and the grace of our Lord overflowed for me with the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. The saying is trustworthy and deserving of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am the foremost. But I received mercy for this reason, that in me, as the foremost, Jesus Christ might display his perfect patience as an example to those who were to believe in him for eternal life. To the King of the ages, immortal, invisible, the only God, be honor and glory forever and ever. Amen.

This charge I entrust to you, Timothy, my child, in accordance with the prophecies previously made about you, that by them you may wage the good warfare, holding faith and a good conscience. By rejecting this, some have made shipwreck of their faith, among whom are Hymenaeus and Alexander, whom I have handed over to Satan that they may learn not to blaspheme.
