Tonight we have an exciting chance to take a look at a unique book of the Bible. The Book of Psalms covers an incredibly wide range of subjects and topics. The Psalms speak to us and for us, functioning as God's Word to us but also as our words to God as we pray.

Here is what some Christians in the past have said about the book of Psalms: Dietrich Bonhoeffer and others have called the Psalms the "prayer book of the Bible", noting the many situations of the author and how we can learn about speaking to God from the author's prayers. Martin Luther called the book of Psalms "the Bible in miniature". In the Psalms we learn of God's incredible wrath, his tremendous mercy, and his overwhelming grace. The Psalms tell us about creation and redemption and include passages about the Exodus, Joshua, and other events and figures from the Bible. Finally, Athanasius said "All the books of Scripture, both Old Testament and New, are inspired by God and useful for instruction, as it is written; but to those who really study it the Psalter yields especial treasure." Tonight we will discuss the many different "types" of Psalms, how the Psalms function as the Word of God to us and words from us to God, and what we can learn about prayer from them. May God bless you as you hear and study his Word.

Now while the Pharisees were gathered together, Jesus asked them a question, saying, "What do you think about the Christ? Whose son is he?" They said to him, "The son of David." He said to them, "How is it then that David, in the Spirit, calls him Lord, saying,

"The Lord said to my Lord,

"Sit at my right hand,

until | put your enemies under your feet"?

If then David calls him Lord, how is he his son?" And no one was able to answer him a word, nor from that day did anyone dare to ask him any more questions.
