#### Pastor's Corner

"This is my beloved son, with whom I am well pleased." The voice from God the Father booms from heaven, revealing Jesus as the Christ to all who had come out to listen to and heed the preaching of John the Baptist that the kingdom of heaven was at hand. Led into the wilderness by the Spirit of God, Jesus is then tempted by the devil after fasting for almost a month and a half. He succeeds where Israel failed, proving his allegiance to God and relying on Scripture to fend off the attacks and temptations of the evil one. Strengthened by angels, Jesus returns to Galilee and begins preaching,

calling disciples and healing those with various afflictions. He heads up a mountain, brings his disciples in close and gives them the Sermon on the Mount. He goes back down the mountain and spends the next two chapters healing, driving out demons, even raising a person from the dead, and calming a storm with a word. Jesus keeps an incredible pace.

And then, when you get to Matthew 10, Jesus tells the Twelve to do what he has been doing. Drive out demons, heal the sick, raise the dead, and preach! Go! Go to the lost sheep of the house of Israel. Do what I have been doing. What are you waiting for?

Mission accomplished, the disciples come back to Jesus who continues doing what he had been doing. Teaching, healing, traveling around. On mountains, on the water. In towns and cities, close to home and far away. Jesus. Never. Stops. He never quits.

And then he is arrested, suffers and dies. But not even this can stop the only good man to ever walk the face of the earth. Jesus conquers death. Nothing can stop him.

But then Jesus turns to the men who had turned their backs on him when he was beaten and tortured and when he suffered and died and tells them that they are the ones who will do what he had been doing. They will be the ones through whom the kingdom of heaven comes; they will be the ones through whom God works to undo the curse and make right what sin has made wrong.

And now you, the baptized and taught, through the centuries that separate you from Peter, James, John and the rest, have inherited what was given to them: the awesome privilege and responsibility of following in the footsteps of Christ to bring the Gospel to all nations. You have been called, commission and equipped to follow in the footsteps of Christ.

The pace you keep is equal to the importance of the mission to which you have been called. There is no other name given to people by which we must be saved than that of Jesus. There is no higher calling that we can have than to represent Christ in the world; to be the people through whom God works to bring salvation.

This is your calling. This is your purpose in life. Christ is with you always—even to the end of the age. Go.

## Vicar's Corner

So often when we encounter a difficult situation we simply can't put together the right words to express how we feel. When a friend's wife has a miscarriage, what are you supposed to say to them? You can't do anything to fix it, and your words of comfort will seem hollow in those first few days as your friend deals with the harsh reality of death. What are you supposed to say to God? When the person (maybe even yourself) who "has it all together" loses their job and the future looks bleak, how do you explain it? Anything that comes out of your mouth is going to be insufficient when it comes to giving them financial assurance. Even speaking of Jesus and what he has done seems to fall flat in terms of soothing their anxiety with their current problem. How do you approach God with this problem?

One option for our personal reflection is to turn to the Psalms, in difficult situations the Psalms of lament are especially appropriate. The book of Psalms is where Christ turned to express his great grief as he bore our sins on the cross, crying out in anguish. Many Psalms start in a very gloomy place. Psalm 22 begins "My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?" Psalm 12 starts off with "Save, O Lord, for the godly one is gone; for the faithful have vanished from among the children of man." The Psalms are real. When David (or another Psalm writer) is mourning, he MOURNS. He doesn't begin with comforting words but cries out with pain and emotion. The Psalms allow us to grieve, to be sorrowful, to mourn, to beg. They allow us to remain in a difficult situation and call things what they are. Evil is evil, death is brutal and unnatural, sin is oppressive. There is no immediate, artificial leap to relief in a difficult situation. But the Psalms also speak of Christ. While they allow us to sit in our grief and pain, they always turn to the Sovereign God who is in control, the God who we know has acted in Christ to undo sin and death. They point us to God's good desires for us, the saving work of Jesus, the forgiveness of sins that comes in His name, and our identity as children of God. They give us words to speak to God when we can't come up with anything to say. Words that express our pain but also remind us of Christ.

This isn't meant to be a shameless plug for a Bible Study here at church, more of an appeal for the use of the Psalms in your daily prayer life. They give words to situations anguish and pain, but also to situations of joy and thankfulness for God's grace and mercy. And they tell of Jesus who has acted on our behalf. The book of Psalms is a masterpiece of poetry, spanning several genres of Poetry but always expressing praise and thanksgiving of the God who made heaven and earth. Although this isn't (only) a plug for Bible Study, if you would like to get deep into the book of Psalms, beginning September 28 we will be studying through the Psalms after our service of prayer and preaching. Study books will be available coming soon. I would love to have you join with us as we pray, struggle with, and learn from the Psalms.
