Just One

Why would a 78-year-old want to continue volunteering as Campus Ministry Director? Because I want to help even one student become a Christian this year.

On April 12 Vusala, a former international student from Azerbaijan who graduated in 2003, came to All Saints bringing her American husband, Lee, with her. They had driven from their home in Washington, DC, just so she could see All Saints again. They came because she had such fond memories of All Saints. As they looked through the old photo albums, she exclaimed about the friendship she had experienced at All Saints. We had not realized how much it meant to her to have our help. Lee thanked us for the kindness we had shown her. As we stood in our sanctuary he commented on the beauty of our altar. Wistfully he said that he had attended a huge and famous mega-church in Los Angeles, California, but had never "caught" the enthusiasm for faith that the congregation showed. He accepted our offer to locate the name of an LCMS church in the DC area. Vusala and Lee were open to receiving this information, as well as the photos we took of their visit. Rev. Larry K. Loree, All Saints campus pastor, found the name and number of a congregation which is only a short distance from their DC home. Their visit inspired me to hope that seeds planted sixteen years ago will grow into faith in Jesus.

All Saints' monthly student Korean meals are really "hope meals." At every meal we invite students to come not only for the meals but also for worship and Bible classes; and especially for the opportunity to share our faith and hear about theirs. Students who have come to meals sometimes ask for rides and for one-on-one lunches.

During these times we have openly explained who Jesus is. I'll never forget that a student from Poland was astonished that his church back home had not shown such friendship for students that he found here. He went home with sweet memories. This gives me hope to keep on serving meals just for the chance that those who have never heard the Gospel will hear it in this place.



Christians are not encouraged to be open in their faith on this secular campus; in fact, they are discouraged from doing so. They are encouraged to keep their faith in their homes and in their churches. Fortunately, Slippery Rock University holds orientations for students where All Saints is allowed to have a table promoting Christian fellowship. We greet students and their parents as they go by our table. We invite them to give us their names and phone numbers so that we can invite them to the student meals when they arrive on campus in the fall. Since there are few Lutherans in this area, few Lutherans come by. But those who do, are glad we are on campus for them. Students from other denominations are happy to

be invited to our meals, worship and Bible study. It is a blessing to be able to share our faith. It is a time of hope. At every orientation gathering we hope that the Holy Spirit will send even one student to us. We just cannot give up.

Happiness is Bible study. Bible study is hope. Two unlikely students come in for weekly Bible classes at All Saints. They are not Lutheran, but they want to know more about the Bible. They are such fun to study with. Genesis comes alive in these classes with the help of The People's Bible, a Bible commentary for laymen.

Chris and Samantha are Americans who have a joy in being Christians. Their enthusiasm is contagious. They give hope for expanding Bible classes to others. In fact, our hope is to expand our Gospel message by inviting students to participate in discussions dealing with the Bible's view of singleness and marriage. Hope is ongoing.

As I sat writing this article on hope, an international student who has been here many times, but has never become a Christian, came into All Saints for sympathy and guidance. She is in a bind. She needs hope. We went over the uselessness of bitterness, of blaming others, of embracing victimhood. She is out of options; her money is gone and her time for being allowed in the United States is over. She can't go home because it is dangerous there, and she is afraid she would be constantly seen by her parents as a failure. We talked of going home anyway. We talked of emigrating to Canada. In the past I would hold out the promise that Jesus makes to be with us, and then we would grasp each other's hands and pray. This time I did not extend this invitation because I did not want to pressure her. But, surprise! She herself held out her hands for prayer without being prompted to do so. We prayed. She needs faith. She needs God's help.

The reason this 78-year-old stays in campus ministry is because God can change even her heart — even a heart which has resisted faith for so many years.

"Let God arise; let His enemies be scattered: let them also that hate Him flee before Him." – Psalm 68:1

These words are the historic Psalm verse of the Introit for Pentecost. Why sing these words on Pentecost? "Arise" makes us think of Easter, after all, of Jesus rising from the dead, or maybe of Christmas or Annunciation, with Jesus leaping down from His royal throne to take on flesh in the Virgin's womb and being born in a stable.

On Pentecost, God sent His Holy Spirit to His Church. He "arose," He went into action, to scatter His enemies, to make them flee before them? What/who are those enemies? You know them well: sin, death, Satan.





Mileposters News

The eighth Mileposters trail mom qualified as captain on the Riverfront Trail April 22, pictured with three sibling riders at the Branchport Boat Club. She captained both with her first stoker and with an alternate. Her prior training ride, without a stoker, was ten miles; the qualifying day's ride was another ten miles. An experienced cyclist, with eighteen grandchildren, and a veteran in Christian education, she qualified easily and works very well with children.

The original Mileposters tandem from 2002, pictured on the Riverfront Trail May 9, which returned from the Rev. Bryan Borger family in Indiana a few years ago and was owned by the family with four captains (three adult and one youth) has now come back to the home stable and is being rebuilt as a commuter/training bike. Unusually short for a tandem, it fits into smaller vehicles than the others. It has been fitted with wing nuts for quick release of the front wheel, crank shorteners in the stoker position, and brass bells. In the picture, it also has a "local" asymmetrical pannier for shorter rides. Other upgrades are in progress, including a "long distance" pannier for the other side.

Total mileage for the beginning of the Puerto Rico campaign, with 5 different riders, as of May 9, stands at 80. All miles ridden through midsummer will be for this effort.

Concordia Salutes 40 Year Employee for Dedicated Service

President and CEO Keith E. Frndak proclaimed the week of May 6 as Lynda Byers Week at Concordia in recognition of 40 years of service to the Cabot community.

Lynda Neupert Byers grew up across the road from Concordia at Cabot and wondered as a teenager standing at Brewer's Barber Shop to catch her school bus what it was like living in that building (Oertel Care Center).

"It never crossed my mind that one day I would work in that building," she laughed. "My Dad delivered potatoes and tomatoes to the home."

And in 1979, looking for job security to raise two sons, she found herself in that very building in the Dietary Department, where she worked for four years.

"I was promoted to head cook within a month and eventually became supervisor," she said. "I learned a lot and still use the same recipe for homemade buns and biscuits."

She reminisced about baking all the pies for festivals and transferring them to the barn (where the annual summer festivals were once held). One of her greatest challenges was learning the names of the 100 residents they served.

Lynda transferred to the Laundry Department and stayed until last June, when she accepted a part-time position at Haven II.

"Thirty-five years ago, we had a washer that looked like a hot water tank cut in half. A release pedal drained the water, but we had to place all of the clothing into an extractor to spin out the excessive water," she explained.

In those days she had two staff members, and together, they did the wash for 100 residents.

"Today there are five staff members caring for 300 residents, with three 100-pound washers and five 125-pound dryers," she said. "While I had more responsibility, with that kind of automation, life was much simpler."

One of her favorite Concordia memories is the Christmas Party when Keith Frndak announced that all 20-year employees were eligible to receive a gift of a vacation or a big screen TV. "We took a nine-day cruise to Bermuda and then to the Caribbean islands of St. Thomas, San Juan and St. Martin," she said.

Lynda still lives across the road, has four grandkids and two great grandchildren and also works at a local greenhouse, where in the summer she plants 100,000 plants. She and her family also like to "garage sale."

She looks back on her first day and how much both Concordia and she have grown – one challenge at a time. "It's always been about the residents," she said. "You give and they give back with kind words, compliments, appreciation and lots of love."
