PALM DEVOTION

"Teach me, O LORD, the way of Your statutes; and I will keep it to the end." - Psalm 119:33

Dearly beloved, it is hard to believe another school year is about to start. It seems like 2018-19 just ended, yet 2019-20 is about to begin. Our children and grandchildren will learn many things and many different subjects. They will learn them to give them a basis for everything that happens in life, so that they may be productive citizens of our country when they are adults.

But no subject is more important than God's Word. That's why our Lutheran schools exist. That's why God gives parents. Dr. Luther expressly states in his Large Catechism that parents are to teach their children the Catechism. We thank God that our pastors and schools do it, but that does not leave us off the hook (I'm a parent too!). God calls every Christian parent to teach his or her children God's Word.

Why is God's Word so important? Why does Asaph in Psalm 78:1-4 sing: "Give ear, O my people, to my teaching; incline your ears to the words of my mouth! I will open my mouth in a parable; I will utter dark sayings from of old, things that we have heard and known, that our fathers have told us. We will not hide them from their children, but tell to the coming generation the glorious deeds of the LORD, and His might, and the wonders that He has done"?

Because our children need to hear the glorious deeds of the LORD. They need to hear how God created everything in 6 24-hour days out of nothing, contrary to the ungodly theory of evolution. They need to hear that God created us male and female and ordained that marriage be a man and a woman for wife, and you know every word of that statement is contradicted today by the world. They need to hear that we are sinners who can't save ourselves from eternal death; we can only be saved for eternal life by the Death and Resurrection of Christ our God. His salvation comes to us through preaching and the Sacraments.

So, let's keep on teaching God's Word, one and all. So, let's study it. Read it every day. Go to your pastor's Bible Class. Listen attentively to the sermon. Ponder what you've heard after church and maybe even all week. Go back to the Catechism to remind yourself what you memorized and learned years ago, and open your hymnal to sing the great hymns of our Faith. Teach these things to your children - Scripture, Catechism, Chorale - and don't be afraid to have them memorize. Let us in these ways write in their hearts the saving Word of God made flesh for our salvation.



A special Father's Day movies event was held June 16, attended by five kids and three adults, who enjoyed an episode of The Real McCoys and analyzed the pilot for a spinoff series following The Greatest American Hero, with William Katt, Robert Culp, Connie Sellecca, and Mary Ellen Stuart, who is an active leader in the drama department at Wheaton College, Billy Graham's alma mater, along with her husband, Mark Lewis, who is the director.



Pictured with two new stokers and a long-time captain at Western Penitentiary is our newest trail dad, another veteran cyclist, who qualified as the second new adult captain June 28, bringing the number of adult captains to six. Another ride is pictured at the quarry on the Panhandle Trail with two of our new stokers. The summer's first new quad stoker team, who made their initial ride May 19, on June 28 did a 12mile round trip on the quad (bike for four riders) on the Youghiogheny River Trail (part of the Great Allegheny Passage), between Boston and Dravo Landing, along with other riders. The stokers are pictured retrieving some water from the well at Dravo, no easy task since the level has dropped with increased trail use, but our five-year-old first-time stoker was up to the challenge. Another guad ride took place three days later, with four other bikes and nine

riders total. There have been eighteen new Mileposters riders so far this year.

On July 4, the group leader celebrated the 24th anniversary of his first ride on the Youghiogheny River Trail (Great Allegheny Passage) by posting the best time in five years on a 20-mile ride: one hour and 54 minutes, all stops included, between Milepost 18 (Dead Man's Hollow) and Milepost 28 (Industry). July 8 was his first 30-mile ride of the season. Soli Deo Gloria.





At this writing, Mileposters have traveled 648 miles in their campaign to raise support for LCMS work in Puerto Rico, already exceeding the 2018 total of 605 miles. To build more mileage, an 85-mile round trip to Connellsville is planned, plus a trip to Rockwood. The Puerto Rico goal this year is a thousand miles.

SAVE THE SEMINARY

The Siberian Lutheran Mission Society

Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod president, Matthew Harrison, has commissioned The Siberian Lutheran Mission Society to see to the continued flourishing of the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Novosibirsk, Siberia. The critical, short-term goal is to provide operating funds for this year and each year through 2023. Long-term, the goal is to build a \$7 million, permanent endowment, capable of making the seminary self-sufficient by 2023.

The challenge for the mission society is to raise an additional \$75,000 each year through 2023 to cover the complete cost of operating the seminary. As word spreads, generous individual donors and congregations are responding, but we greatly need the support and prayers of Missouri Synod Lutherans everywhere, as well. Will you help us spread the word about our immediate and long-term goals to keep the Novosibirsk seminary operating?

Securing the perpetual sustainability of the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Novosibirsk requires meeting two vital goals simultaneously—raising \$75,000 each year through 2023 to keep the seminary doors open until the long-term goal of establishing a \$7 million endowment has been reached.

Rev. Richard Wokoma, LCMS Missionary to Nigeria Zion Lutheran Church, Bridgeville, Sunday, September 15th




Rev. Richard Wokoma, who serves the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) as a theological educator in Africa, will be visiting Zion, Bridgeville Sunday, September 15. He will be the guest preacher at the 8:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. Divine Services and will give a presentation with Q & A at 9:15 a.m. between both services. A light brunch will be served.

Rev. Richard Wokoma was born in Africa. He graduated from Schiller International University, London, in 1985 with a bachelor's degree in international relations, and in 1986 with a master's degree in international law. He then attended New York University and started on a doctoral degree. During this time, he decided to attend Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, where he received his Master of Divinity in 1997. During his seminary vicarage, he studied at Drew Theological School at Drew University, Madison, N.J., and received his Master of Sacred Theology degree focused on patristic and early Christian liturgies.

Once his seminary studies were completed, Rev. Wokoma returned to Africa to translate the Book of Concord into his native language, Kalabari. He also preached in local African congregations and conducted Bible studies and led devotions. In 2001, he received a call from the LCMS Texas District

to serve in the Houston area. While in Texas, he served as director of the LINC Bible Institute and traveled to Africa several times to teach seminarians and pastors. In September 2013, he accepted a call to be a theological educator in Africa. Since this time, he has been teaching and preaching at different congregations each week.

The goal was to collect \$500, but the VBS offerings and donations exceeded that, and Mt. Calvary continued to accept donations for Cohen through the end of July.

Thanks to all the volunteers who prepared the meals, taught classes, helped with set up and clean up, and worked behind the scenes, and especially to VBS Director Georgeanne Paprocki, who organized everything.

In other news, Mt. Calvary has a variety of 3-part (SSA) sacred music available at no cost. There are 15 to 30 copies of each selection, and approximately 50 different titles – both traditional and classical music. Several collections are available

Concordia Golf Classic 2019 Raises Funds for Charity Care




