

Campus Ministry: a Lifesaver

Campus ministry means even more to me because our oldest granddaughter went off to college this semester. Our prayers are that she will find a campus ministry at her university.

College students are basically the same as students were twenty-five years ago. Although they are much more tech savvy, they are still often broken on the inside, no matter how well-adjusted they seem to be on the outside. The recent suicide of a Slippery Rock University student who was a popular leader on campus made this shockingly apparent. He allowed inner pain, which he had not shared with anyone, to overwhelm him. So he took his own life.

A bright young student popped in to campus ministry on the first day of classes this semester. Thankfully, she had the courage to come and ask for help in dealing with some personal painful issues. College students need unconditional friendship and the clear Gospel. All Saints campus ministry has these for students.

The important thing is that through campus ministry many people are reaching out and providing care for students. Xueni (pronounced shoo NEE) is one example of how campus ministry makes the difference. Xueni is a Chinese college student who came to Slippery Rock eight years ago. She took a break from her college courses in China to work as a nanny for an American couple who have lovingly adopted several children from China. They invited Xueni to be a nanny so she could help care for their young family. While Xueni lived with them she wanted to meet more Americans. Someone at Slippery Rock University suggested that she contact All Saints Campus Ministry, saying that they were very friendly and therefore would be happy to help. We invited Xueni to our annual Thanksgiving dinner in our home, and she came. Then

she gladly accepted our invitation to study the Bible two or three times a week at All Saints. What a remarkable student she was and is! She soaked up the Bible like a sponge. Studying the Bible quickly became the center of her life. She realized that her passion was sharing the Gospel. She wanted to be baptized, but something held her back: she wanted to be baptized with her father. The first thing she did when she went home to China was to be baptized with him.

One thing led to another. An international professor who came to campus ministry to improve his English and to learn a little of the Bible introduced Xueni to a couple who were getting ready to go to China as missionaries. They became



close. This couple gave advice to Xueni about how she could serve God. They guided her while she was living in China, Angola, and Australia. Since they are back in Ohio now, they brought Xueni to visit All Saints this summer. Xueni is now attending Texas Tech University in Lubbock, Texas. She has an internship teaching Chinese to English speaking students, and she has a scholarship to study linguistics. thanks the missionary couple for all their prayers. Xueni explained that it was not easy to know where she should work or study. What made a difference was the help from campus ministry and help from friends who gave her advice and love. I will never forget her time in Bible class. The thing that stays in my mind is one statement it seems like she made repeatedly: "I have one more question!" She always wanted to learn more about God's Word.

Not all students need as much as Xueni did, but almost all of them could use a place to be: a home away from home. Effective campus ministry makes a huge difference for impressionable and vulnerable young people. I hope it will in my granddaughter's life, too. Each of our student Korean meals will be introduced with the words that whatever their burdens or challenges or fears are, All Saints campus ministry is here for them. We want to do all we can to help.

Mileposters News

The Still Ravaged campaign to support LCMS ministry in Puerto Rico has finished, with a total of 1,024 miles. Appeal letters are being mailed out. Although Dorian mostly missed Puerto Rico, the damage from Maria has still been only minimally repaired. Some 30,000 homes are still missing their roofs, making do with the familiar blue emergency tarps. Over a thousand roads are still blocked, and Puerto Rico is \$70 billion in debt.

The effort to support Campus Ministry at First Trinity in Oakland has begun, with 396 miles ridden so far. Included are 5 miles by the 20th and 21st new riders of the season on August 19 (pictured), one of two round trips between Greenfield and Downtown on the Eliza Furnace Trail; the other was August 22 (also pictured).

In order to get more riders out at the same time, another tandem, a Raleigh Companion, has been added to the stable, purchased in Waynesburg, PA on August 29.

TATO-O-O

Both captain and stoker positions are short, enabling smaller riders to fit. Also acquired in August were two aluminum alloy frames, one to re-frame the second Mileposters tandem, and the other for future expansion or replacement. Three of the current tandems were built by the group leader, customized for smaller stokers, and in one case for our shortest adult captain ever; it is now perfect for our newest trail mom.

On September 2, the group leader, riding the original Mileposters tandem alone, broke his season record by doing 20 miles in 1 hour and 49 minutes, all stops included, on a round trip from Buena Vista, PA to Cedar Creek County Park in Westmoreland County--the new best time in five years.



INTERNATIONAL MISSION

Rev. Charles Wokoma, LCMS Missionary to Nigeria

On Sunday, September 15, Zion Lutheran Church, Bridgeville, received a very special visitor from Nigeria - Rev. Charles Wokoma. Rev. Charles Wokoma is a called LCMS missionary who serves in Nigeria as a theological educator. He teaches a wide range of classes to students on theology and scripture. Rev. Wokoma was born in Nigeria, became a U.S. citizen, and is a graduate of Concordia Theological Seminary, Ft. Wayne.

During his visit to Zion, Rev. Wokoma preached at both divine services. During the Bible study hour, Zion hosted a light continental breakfast to about 75 persons as Rev. Wokoma gave a presentation highlighting his work in Nigeria. Rev. Wokoma shared with Zion the many challenges students face coming to the seminary to study to become a Lutheran pastor. The majority of students come well below the poverty level even in Nigeria. They often tend farms on the seminary grounds to help provide food for themselves and others while they study. A grant given several years ago from the LCMS allowed the seminary to build a fish farm. The fish farm provides students with much needed protein. As Rev. Wokoma remarked, "due to the lack of protein in their diet many of the students were tired and falling asleep during class." In addition to the food challenges, students have difficulty procuring proper clothing and medical care while they attend the seminary. A recent grant from Concordia Lutheran Ministries has been very beneficial in providing medical care, and additional food staples to the students. The seminary is very thankful for her partnership with so many individual donors, congregations and organizations that support their work of training young men for the pastoral ministry.

During Rev. Wokoma's presentation, he also shared the growing threat of militant Islam that he, the students and the seminary face on a daily basis. Several Lutheran churches have been looted and even bombed in regions where the terrorist organization, *Boko Haram*, is active. In spite of their financial needs and lack of safety, students still flock to the seminary and are very dedicated to the work of Christ and His church. If you would like to support Rev. Moreover, developing and nurturing the faith in such a manner as this program benefits the development of the athlete's Christian identity within his/her respective sport. Athletes who remember St. Paul's words from 1 Corinthians 6:19-20 compete with the intent of not their own glory, but the glory of God who has bestowed such gifts and talents.

Pray that the student athletes in this program will become the future witnesses that will joyfully boast about Christ.

Concordia Lutheran Ministries is home to 55 residents who are 100 or more years old. Seven of those enjoyed birthdays between August 10 and September 9.


