Our forefathers built churches and established congregations in our boroughs and neighborhoods as places for the faithful to gather to hear and receive Jesus' Word and Sacraments. They provided us with ministers called in Jesus' name and stead to preach His Word and administer His Sacraments to us. It is our privilege and calling to do the same for our descendants in the Faith.

The legacy of your congregation is the saving Gospel of Jesus Christ proclaimed in your location from generation to generation. 

On June 17th and 18th delegates convened at First Trinity Lutheran Church in Tonawanda, New York for the 100th Regular Convention of the Eastern District, LCMS. At the opening of the convention there were 73 Lay delegates and 65 Clergy delegates present for a total

number of 138 voting delegates which established a quorum at 11:18 a.m. on Friday June 17, 2022.



"Certainly, one of Redeemer's greatest and far-reaching outreach opportunities is Redeemer Lutheran School," noted Charlie and Beth Buttgereit, lifetime members of Redeemer.

"Redeemer Preschool began in the early 1980s and consisted of a handful of students and one full-time teacher and one part-time teacher. Our school enables the children to hear God's word on a daily basis," Charlie said.

And that is one of the many reasons the current chairman of the RLS Board Connor Hagey and his wife Linda decided to start his four children there. "From a parent standpoint we find that this decision is absolute. This choice is nothing short of necessary," he said.

"I want kids to be able to talk about things they can't in what we refer to as public schools," he continued. "And not waste their time learning things of no value. We have graduates with semesters and more under their belt for college," Connor maintained.

One of them, Joshua Hanley, class of 2015, is an attorney. "I grew up at Redeemer. I graduated with more than a year of college credits already completed. That enabled me to graduate from Pitt in three years and go directly to law school. Now, I am years ahead of my peers because of the strong start I had at Redeemer."

Redeemer's Pastor, Rev'd. Brian P. Westgate provides the history. In September of 1983, Redeemer Lutheran School was begun as a preschool with an enrollment of nine. Janet Stechholz, wife of the current pastor, Rev. Dr. David Stechholz, was the first teacher until 1986 when Gail Holzer began her 37-year tenure as teacher, principal, and current administrator. Enrollment grew to forty-two when in 1993 Kindergarten classes were state approved for four students. The elementary school (first and second grade) was officially established in 1996 at Grace in Penn Hills due to building ordinance issues at the Oakmont campus.

The following year grade three was added and the school moved into the Fellowship Hall at Redeemer and added an art and music teacher. Another year and another grade and building expansion. The courtyard was enclosed in 1998 and the following year the school wing was built with five classrooms. Sixth grade was added in 2000. Seven years later both seventh and eighth grade were added and two teachers who continue their role today – Carol Schumacher and Sarah Holzer Driscoll – assisted in the school's NLSA accreditation.

In 2009, girls' basketball was initiated as the first sports team. The school continued to grow and finally moved to the former Penn Hill's Shenandoah School with the beginning of the 2011-12 school year. At that time high school classes were launched, with a new grade being added each year.

It was in the spring of 2011 that John Driscoll, a lifelong member of Redeemer - baptized in 1982; confirmed in 1997 in the same class as Sarah Holzer, married in 2008 to Sarah - became involved with RLS.

"After graduating from Slippery Rock in 2007, I struggled to obtain a full-time teaching job in the public school system," he recalled. Gail had asked him a few times if he would be interested in teaching at Redeemer and he continually refused with the answer, "I want to be the light in the darkness."

However, when Redeemer decided to start a high school, he agreed to serve on a committee to establish curriculum and create a handbook. At the same time, Pennsylvania cut education funding which caused a lot of furloughs making it even more difficult to secure a teaching position. After completing the handbook, Gail needed a high school literature teacher and asked if he would be interested.

"I prayed hard on that one," he remembered. "And it was one of my favorite decisions ever. I am still a 'light in the darkness' just in a different sense than I thought! God had an amazing way of opening and closing doors for what is best for His people," John exclaimed.

He was commissioned in 2015 and currently serves as the Dean of Students as well as teaching middle school and high school literature and high school theology.

"The new school building, formerly the Penn Hills Shenandoah School was dedicated in the presence of Synodical President Matthew Harrison as well as English District Bishop Stechholz, whose son had attended Shenandoah, on August 28, 2011," noted Pastor Westgate, a milestone in the history of Redeemer and among the Lutheran church bodies in western PA.

The 2014-2015 school year marked the first high school graduating class of Redeemer Lutheran High School, the only Lutheran high school in Pennsylvania. Again Pastor/Bishop Stechholz was present to see the fruits of his labors some 30 years before.

And in 2016-2017, RLS recorded the highest enrollment at 292 at this time having complemented the staff with a Spanish teacher, a special Education program, an Admissions Counselor and an ECE Early Childhood Education) Director.

Today, the school includes preschool through 12th grade and has 270 students.

"Redeemer has grown from a stand-alone Preschool to a school serving Preschool through High School students because parents asked us to expand our influence to their children, "said Gail Holzer, Administrator since 1983.

Parents requested a Kindergarten; two years later, an elementary school, then a middle school and finally a high school. Each step of the way the members of Redeemer were willing to walk through the open doors and provide a Christ-centered Lutheran education for families in Pittsburgh, according to Gail.

"It's a safe place for their child to learn and develop - not only keeping them physically safe, but spiritually safe and emotionally safe as well," described Gail. "Many are frustrated with the absence of basic morality in schools, and the ungodly agenda that is consistently pushed through district curriculum and policies," she clarified.

"College partnerships with Concordia University in WI and Grand Canyon allow students to earn transferable college credits and AP courses."

The strong music program has won RLS three Gene Kelly Music Awards for its musicals. Middle School Robotics earned in invitation to World Competition according to Jean Wilshire, Director of Marketing/Administrative Assistant.

Jean and her husband Rob were married at Redeemer. "When my first daughter became preschool age in 1996, I started to send her to the three-year old class once a week. While she was in class with her aunt (Gail Holzer), I volunteered to do office work for Gail, who was the PreK director/teacher."

All of their children attended RLS beginning with preschool. Their oldest daughter Addy was a graduate of the first eighth grade class. Son Sam graduated from the high school in 2018 (graduated in architectural engineering 2022); Grace in 2019 as co-valedictorian.

Grace is in her last year as an elementary education major at Concordia University Wisconsin where she plays womens soccer and lacrosse. She credits growing up at Redeemer with her career pattern. "Throughout my school years I was blessed to participate in mission trips and got to really know teachers and staff. They were like family."

She emphasized the class size allowing the teacher to have more interaction with the student and the fact that she was able to talk about things other than academics. "My favorite experience was the ability to be involved in multiple extracurriculars at the same time." She led a week of summer camp at RLS preparing her for student teaching in her last semester and definitely wants to stay in Christian education. Would she return to RLS? "It's a missions and Christ-centered school that I want to be a part of," was her candid answer.

Current Spanish teacher Anna Auernhamer, a member of St. John's Millvale, shared Grace's opinion. "The small class sizes allow for more personalized instruction and more feedback from teachers. Students also form close relationships with their classmates as they learn together, play together, and serve together," she said. Anna mentioned too that "students learn to be outstanding citizens and faithful Christians, and then they are sent out to be a 'light in the world.' "

According to Gail more than 80% of their students come from the community, and while 70% say they are Christians, many are not practicing the faith. "The opportunity to teach and model the Christian faith to children from age three until they are 17 or 18, is an amazing gift that we have."

Preschool-12th grade classes continue at the Verona campus, and preschool classes continue to be held at the church as well. College partnerships with Concordia WI and Grand Canyon allow students to earn transferable college credits. Other benefits include AP courses, a strong music program, athletics, and leadership opportunities.

Dr. Luther said education should be an extension of the home. "RLS strives to be an extension to the Christian home and bring Christ to homes who do not yet have Him as their Head," explained Gail.

Redeemer has been incredibly blessed with the servant-minded attitude of people from Redeemer Lutheran Church and sister congregations, faculty, and staff. "We at RLS are reminded of Paul's statement about spreading the saving message of the Gospel in 1 Corinthians 3:5-7, What then is Apollos? What is Paul? Servants through whom you believed, as the Lord assigned to each. I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. So, neither he who plants, nor he who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth.

At any given time in a child's life the mission of RLS is planting or watering the seed of faith, but it is God who gives growth. We are not always permitted to see the fruits of our labor, but it cannot stop us from our mission, for we know from 1 Timothy 2:3-4, This is good, and it is pleasing in the sight of God our Savior, who desires all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth.

Earlier this year, Redeemer Lutheran High School marked its 10th anniversary with a celebration dinner at Highpointe at Rebecca. One of the newer teachers, Sarah Stanley, expressed what RLS means to her. "My time with RLS has been an absolute blessing." Only in her second year she said she feels like she has been here forever. "The relationships I have built with staff and students have given me a sense of belonging that I have not experienced anywhere else."

She believes there is future opportunities for this school. "There is an abundance of potential within the walls that God has blessed us with. I would love to see those walls expand," she said.

That is a wish that may come true. Gail's greatest challenge of providing appropriate space and structure for a developing High School program that includes an athletic and performing venue as well as classrooms may well have found a solution as another door has opened for this ministry's expansion.

Gail announced that the members of Trinity Lutheran Church in Monroeville graciously gave RLS their church building. "We were able to sell the facility and will use those funds as seed money for a capital campaign to add a full-size gymnasium and classrooms for our middle/high students."

On behalf of the board, Connor stated, "I am happy to be part of a team that is dedicated to see this through. Making hard choices so kids can have an option is our responsibility. I want it to be a sweeping success and dispel the thinking that Lutheran education is only about teaching Lutheranism and all other things fall by the wayside. The schools of today are subject to the ebb and flow of the world. Redeemer is not," he stressed.

"We need to grow and continue to be challenged and the challenge is growth. It is a good challenge as we want to be able to accommodate more students," he pointed out.

Redeemer Lutheran School may best be described by the former Director of LCMS School Ministry Dr. Bill Cochran, "A small school that thinks and acts like a large school."

The Mikey Dee Band brought down the house with a variety of everyone's favorite tunes, and over thirty classic cars and tractors were on campus for a car cruise.


