"The Thanksgiving of Faith"



"Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God; and the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." - Philippians 4:6-7

November is the month of Fall leaves, college football, and our National Day of Thanksgiving. Each year, we travel in record numbers to gather with family and friends around a table bedecked with food to enjoy one another's company and to give thanks. We often ask one another, "For what are you thankful this year?" to which we ponder and respond with a particular moment of joy or with a more generic answer about life and loved ones.

Saint Paul presents us with what appears to be a challenge. He calls upon us not only to be thankful for this or that thing, but to be thankful for everything. Everything. Even, and especially, for those things that cause us anxiety. His letter to the Philippians exhorts us to pray about everything with thanksgiving. Our prayers are not just to include an offhand "thank you" to Jesus but are to be said from a perspective of thankfulness. How are we to be thankful for everything? How can we be thankful for ill-health, financial troubles, broken relationships, and tragedies?

On Thanksgiving Day, we are called upon to count our blessings. Think about that. How have you been blessed even on your worst day? Christians have a "big picture" faith. That is, everything we believe and trust is based on the promise of the resurrection through Jesus Christ. Since we have the same spirit of faith, according to what is written, "I believed and therefore I spoke," we also believe and therefore speak, knowing that He who raised up the Lord Jesus will also raise us up with Jesus, and will present us with you. For all things are for your sakes, that grace, having spread through the many, may cause thanksgiving to abound to the glory of God. Therefore we do not lose heart. Even though our outward man is perishing, yet the inward man is being renewed day by day. (2 Corinthians 4:13-16) Our trust in the promise of resurrection and our eternal salvation alters our perspective. Rather than looking at all of life from the perspective of death, we do so (even the bad parts) from the perspective of life.

The tragedies of life, as difficult and painful as they may be, cannot separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus. Even death itself has no more dominion over us. Suffering leading to death is meaningless, but suffering seen in the light of Christ has meaning. We see all our sufferings in the context of the suffering and death of Jesus for us. Suffering is no longer something that happens to us but is turned into something that can be for our neighbor. It is hard to see or understand how God uses our suffering for the benefit of others. It may be so that others see us endure pain just as Jesus endured the pain of the cross. It may be for us to experience suffering in order that we may be empathetic to the sufferings of others. Whatever the case, we can, with thanksgiving, make our requests known to God.

Thanksgiving stems from faith in Jesus's forgiveness, mercy, and promise of eternal life. From this thanksgiving comes a prayerful life in Christ that casts off the anxieties of a dying world and instead brings a hopeful mercy and peace to our lives and to that of our neighbors.



Can I be Baptized?

This story of conversion may sound like a fairytale, but it is not. It's true. We may even wonder if God can bring a person to such a degree of faith that he declares, "I feel like I've always been a Lutheran Church Missouri Synod believer." This from a young man born into, not just a different denomination, but a different religion.

When I first heard this story I wanted to shout the good news from the rooftops, but I cannot because possible harm could come to this student who has left his faith. Some students have been questioned by government representatives when they return to their home countries. To protect him I will do what <u>Doorsteps</u> (www.ISM inc. org, the LCMS publication published by the International Student Organization) has begun to do when they write about international students. I will share of the great news but will omit mentioning real names and avoid photographs as well. I want to tell the story to encourage everyone to realize that God continues to give faith even in the most unexpected ways.

The first time I heard Mohammad's (not his real name) story it was said that when he entered a Lutheran church he saw the font which he recognized as being for baptism. He immediately asked the pastor why he couldn't be baptized. The pastor heard his confession of faith and said that he could be baptized. One week later he was.

The fuller faith story is that Mohammad's parents came from a Middle East Muslim country. Mohammad was born in this country and raised in a Muslim family with parents and siblings who love him. He says he was always aware of God, but didn't know Him. He attended a Christian pre-school in New York City where he learned a number of children's songs such as "Jesus loves me this I know." He enjoyed the Bible stories, songs, and fellowship, but did not yet understand that Jesus was God's Son.

His early schooling was in a public school until COVID hit. About that time his family transferred him to a Catholic school which had a reputation for high standards and good teaching. Amazingly, the theology teacher in that Catholic school was an LCMS member. He became aware of Mohammad's deep interest in the Christian faith, so he taught him what Lutherans believe and gave him books to read. Along the way Mohammad read books like <u>Luther's Small Catechism</u> and Daniel Preus's <u>Why I Am a Lutheran Jesus at the Center</u>, (CPH 2004). He also watched a number of pastors who preach on television. Actually, he felt he was a Christian because of the TV sermons. And yet, as he shared with his Lutheran teacher, he felt something was missing from those TV sermons. He especially doubted TV preachers' teaching on baptism and the Lord's Supper.

Mohammad's teacher scheduled a breakfast with his LCMS pastor so that Mohammad could get answers to his theological questions. They did talk. They did more than that: the pastor realized that Mohammad was a believer and believed the LCMS teachings on baptism and the Lord's Supper. The following Sunday he was baptized in church. That was in October 2021.

The following December 25 he was confirmed and able to take his first Communion, which gave him great joy. However, he did not tell his family until at least nine days later for the simple reason that he was afraid to tell them. Wonderfully, when he did tell them they felt that what faith was doing to their son was better than no faith at all. Not all of Mohammad's aunts and uncles might agree with what he has done, so caution is used in telling the story within the extended family.

This student is a transformed person. He enjoys debating social issues, sharing meals with his college roommate, but most of all his joy in inviting other students to his church, and studying the Bible at the adult Sunday School class before church. He even attends a Sunday night Bible study held as his college nearby, where his pastor, vicar and a church member explain the Augsburg Confession. His joy in the Lord is not forced. He really is very glad to have his faith as a gift from God.

Campus ministry at All Saints is blessed to have students visit All Saints and worship here. Sometimes we meet students who are struggling to keep their faith, students who are unsure of their faith, and students who were raised in the faith, but are wavering now. So a student like Mohammad is a blessing. What a joy to know that God brings faith even today when we may be inclined to doubt that God can bring faith to a generation that seems determined to push God aside. With the help of Rev. Jacob Deal, Vicar Wessel and Church Member Moses Greenspan, All Saints will continue to be grateful for the opportunity to help nurture college students.

It is with thankful hearts that we announce a celebration in honor of Zion's 155th Anniversary on **Sunday, November 5, 2023**. God has provided an ongoing ministry in Lawrenceville since early 1868 through our beloved Zion, currently the oldest existing church in this section of Pittsburgh and one of only two denominational churches still standing.

We have been blessed that Rev. C. Ronald Rafferty, who served Zion and Immanuel in Braddock in a dual pastorship from 2005 - 2011, will be our guest preacher for the **3:30 p.m.** Divine Service. A catered dinner will follow in the church undercroft.



Zion- Lawrenceville and Bethel hosted the LWML Fall Rally Pittsburgh Zone on Saturday, October 14 at Zion and welcomed ladies from Calvary (Murrysville) Christ (Forest Hills), Good Shepherd (Whitehall), Mt. Olive (Beaver Falls), Prince of Peace (Freedom), St. Luke (Cabot), St. John's (Millvale), and Zion (Bridgeville). Rev. Donn Woolweber, pastor at Bethel and Zion, conducted a brief devotion with a compelling message about the gift of servanthood. Speaker Dee Grzyb, LWML Eastern District Zone President led discussion of avenues of membership recruitment and the changes over the decades of women who serve. The ingathering of classroom sup-

plies, underwear/socks/diapers was designated to Heritage Community Initiatives located in Braddock. Marking its 40th year of service, Heritage serves hundreds of at-risk children, preparing education programs; operates a fixed-route transportation service in 17 communities in Eastern Allegheny County (the only human services nonprofit in the Commonwealth designated by PennDOT as a provider of public transportation) and designing, preparing and delivering meals to students as well as other organizations serving at-risk youth and seniors living in poverty.

Bethel has been hosting a game night on the third Friday of each month beginning at 6:30 p.m. as a fundraiser for the Bethel/Zion LWML chapter.

Zion-Lawrenceville premiered the movie "Storm and Luther's Forbidden Letter" Sunday, Oct. 22, following lunch. The movie is described as follows: "When his father is arrested for printing a forbidden letter written by controversial reformer Martin Luther, 12-year-old Storm escapes with the original. On the run from the authorities, Storm finds unexpected help from Maria, a young girl who lives in the city's underground tunnels.
