PALM DEVOTION

Matthew 9:35-38 - ³⁵Jesus went about all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues, preaching the gospel of the kingdom, and healing every sickness and every disease among the people. ³⁶But when He saw the multitudes, He was moved with compassion for them, because they were weary and scattered, like sheep having no shepherd. ³⁷Then He said to His disciples, "The harvest truly is plentiful, but the laborers are few. ³⁸Therefore pray the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into His harvest."

It isn't hard to imagine Jesus looking at our cities and villages in the Pittsburgh region and being moved with the same compassion that He had in Galilee. Pittsburgh is blessed with a vibrant, economically stable, socially diverse metropolitan area. Yet, so many people are weighed down with the changes and chances of this life. Be it the onslaught of the information stream in social media and the news cycle or the concerns of health, employment, and finances, our neighbors struggle in a world that has no lasting answers, living in a state of unending crisis.

While government and community agencies try to keep up with social welfare programs, the one thing that they do not and cannot provide is the one thing that is most needful – hope in Jesus Christ. Many people have lost their way and we now have a generation for whom many have never even been inside of a church. Families struggle with health crises, crushing debt, pornography and opiate addiction among a myriad of other issues. The worldly philosophy of "don't worry, be happy" just doesn't bear the weight of the anxiety of life and certainly not the despair of sin.

The people of Pittsburgh are hungry. Not for a morsel of food or a little more wealth. They are hungry for meaningful and transcendent answers to the big questions about sin and suffering, life and death, good and evil. They are hungry for the Gospel. They are "weary and scattered, like sheep having no shepherd."

The LCMS congregations in the Pittsburgh Area that make up PALM are blessed to have those answers. Our people and our pastors have the eternally relevant Gospel of Jesus Christ, God come in our flesh to suffer our grief and sorrow and to die our death for us. 

When campus ministry called her this semester to invite her to our student meals and to Sunday morning worship, she was really pleased. She told us that she is Lutheran but had attended church infrequently. She added that she had been confirmed, but had learned very little of the Bible. She was not blaming anyone. She just said that for the challenges she now faces at

college, she believes she needs to know more of the Bible. How great is that!

Daisy now comes once a week for Bible study. We're beginning with Luke so she knows exactly who Jesus is. During one class she asked why some people are atheists. She just wondered how this could be since the Bible tells us who God is. She appreciated learning about the free will given to us. We are using the Concordia Bible History and the Book of Luke in The People's Bible Commentary for our study. The present and the future of campus ministry is teaching the Bible so that students like Daisy will know why they believe what they believe.



Our blind stoker, riding with her original captain, has turned another 18 miles in support of our campaign for Campus Ministry at First Trinity Lutheran in Oakland. At this writing, the total is 603.

Another recent ride was made on the North Bend Rail Trail in West Virginia, which has many tunnels. On September 14, the group leader, once again on the original Mileposters tandem alone, rode 20 miles in 1 hour and 39 minutes, all stops included, 12.1 miles per hour, ten minutes faster than two weeks previous, his personal best, on a second round trip from Buena Vista, PA to Cedar Creek County Park in Westmoreland County.

Both captain and stoker were delighted at the performance of the bike, which has trigger shifters and wide-range gearing to deal with hilly trails.

On Saturday, October 5, Holy Cross Lutheran Mission in the Hazelwood neighborhood of Pittsburgh was blessed to receive prayers and encouragement from several honored guests: The Rev. Jameson Hardy, Bishop of the English District LCMS; The Rev. Robert Zagore, Director of the Office of National Missions in St. Louis; Deaconess Pam Nielsen, Associate Executive Director of LCMS Communications; and Mr. Eric Lunsford, the Synod Photographer.

The morning began with a driving tour of the Hazelwood neighborhood led by Rev. Douglas Spittel. The guests were shown Hazelwood Green which is currently under development by the city of Pittsburgh, the former St. Ann's Church and the former YMCA building on Chatsworth Ave., and they were also shown the Episcopal Church of the Good Shepherd just off of Second Ave. These three buildings are possible future locations of Holy Cross Lutheran Mission. The guests were driven to St. Paul's Lutheran Church (ELCA) where they met some of the members of St. Paul's who operate a thriv-


ing food and clothing distribution in their church basement (street level). These compassionate people are faithful attendees of Holy Cross Mission's Wednesday Prayer and Bible Class. After a brief visit at St. Paul's, the delegation from Synod, Vicar Kern, and Deaconess Hanna Kern walked through Hazelwood to the Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh in Hazelwood. This is the regular meeting place for Holy Cross Mission. During the walk, Rev. Zagore noted the abundance of children in the neighborhood. Hazelwood is above average in the city of Pittsburgh for children under the age of 18. Many of these children live in single parent households and are not currently members of any church. Many churches in the Hazelwood neighborhood have been forced to close their doors in recent years, and it seems as though even more will follow suit very soon. The Hazelwood neighborhood is a perfect example of our Lord's words in Matthew chapter 9, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore, pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest."

Al's Bike Drive for Toys for Tots for Christmas 2019

When Al Todd and his family, active members of Bethel Lutheran Church in Glenshaw for 20 years, found out that the Marine Corps Toys for Tots program was in need of bicycles for needy children for the upcoming Christmas, Al took action to raise enough money to purchase 33 bikes for them. Al was told at that time that donors generally didn't donate bicycles and that the Marines. if given cash to purchase toys, are limited in the amount they can spend on each toy, making a new bicycle an impossibility. That was 12 years ago. Since then, thousands of new bikes have been donated through the nonprofit organization he founded after that initial purchase. Last Christmas, Al's Bike Drive was able to purchase 1,073 new bicycles for Toys for Tots. The organization, run by volunteers, has become the largest and virtually sole provider of new bikes for Toys for Tots in southwestern Pennsylvania.

Al has been a representative of Thrivent Financial for the past 25 years and is actively involved in charitable events in the Pittsburgh area. His biggest passion, however, is providing bikes to needy children and teens in our area.

Al's Bike Drive has been working with Walmart in Gibsonia for the past 5 years to acquire and assemble such a massive quantity of bicycles. Each year, volunteers gather on the first Thursday of December to load bikes onto vehicles. Those vehicles then form a police escorted caravan and haul the bikes to Wildwood Country Club where they are formally presented to representatives
